


May of 2023 holds the record for the warmest surface temperatures experienced in the North Atlantic.

Hazy Skies and Our Planet's Cries

Alarming levels of air pollutants in the Earth's atmosphere are a direct result of human activity.

Here are some of the most prominent types of pollution that inhibit clear blue skies and also greatly contribute to numerous human and environmental health problems.

Methane (CH₄)

Greenhouse Gas

The second most abundant form of emissions (11.4%) caused by human activity. While less prominent in comparison to CO2, it is significantly more harmful.

Natural gas systems and raising livestock are the most significant sources of methane emissions.

Fluorinated Gases

Greenhouse Gas

There are four types: hydrofluorocarbons, perfluorocarbons, sulfur hexafluoride, and nitrogen trifluoride.

Although the least abundant of the greenhouse gases, they are entirely unnatural and can last thousands of years in the atmosphere.

Carbon Dioxide

Greenhouse Gas

The most abundant of all emissions created by human activity. It accounts for 79.4% of all emissions.

The majority of carbon dioxide emissions are derived from the burning of fossil fuels.

Nitrous Oxide (N₂O)

Greenhouse Gas
Even more potent than CO2 or Methane,
it accounts for 6.2% of emissions.

Agriculture is the greatest culprit of nitrous oxide emissions.
