THE Troubles with Food Insecurity

What is a food desert?

Food deserts exist in areas in which food insecurity is largely caused by the lack of access to healthy, affordable food.

If one does not have a viable form of transportation and the nearest grocery store is miles away, it becomes nearly impossible to obtain fresh and nutritious foods for themselves.

Furthermore, with the ever-increasing prices of groceries, it is often more manageable for these households to purchase foods from the less healthy, albeit far cheaper alternatives such as fast food joints and convenience stores.

What Does Food Insecurity Look Like?

- Being uncertain of one's ability to provide enough food for the entire household in order to adequately meet everyone's needs.
- Not having enough money to buy food.
- Skipping meals for other family members to have a full meal.
- Not being able to afford fresh produce.
- Choosing options that are less healthy because they are more affordable and offered in larger quantities.

Food Justice

Food Justice is accomplished when every person's nutritional needs are met.

In a country that wastes 133 <u>BILLION</u>
pounds of food each year, it is
unimaginable that anyone in the US
should still struggle with any level of food
insecurity.

A systemic issue, such as this, requires structural transformations to ensure adequate access to nutritious foods exists nationwide.


Impacts of Food Insecurity

- Poor Mental and Physical Health
- Malnutrition
- Difficulties with Concentration
- Developmental and Behavioral Health Concerns Amongst Children

Facts and Figures

- In the US, nearly 13% of the population (17 million people) face some level of food insecurity.
- 22.4% of Black households and 16.2% of Hispanic households experienced food insecurity in 2022.
- According to the USDA, food produced in the US could supply 4,000 calories of food to each person every day.


This USDA graph categorizes the different forms of food insecurity which exist and which issues are most prominent amongst the US population.

Immediate and Long-term Solutions:

- Community Gardens
- Food Drives
- Food Banks
- Food Co-ops
- Offer fresh produce in convenience stores.
- Strengthening the Farm Bill
- Advocate for the expansion of SNAP and TEFAP.
- Build grocery stores in underserved neighborhoods to dismantle food deserts.
